#### Where Did We Come From and How Did We Get Here?

"It started with just one monkey. He seemed friendly enough, and we trusted him when we followed him down the dirt roads of Azrou's Mount Rachidia in Morocco's mid-Atlas mountains. But then we realized he was not alone. We were walking through a colony of monkeys. Big monkeys. They stepped out slowly, but were soon surrounding us, becoming defensive of their territory. We were nine, and they were dozens. Five of our group got past the first pack of them, but the other four (myself included) turned and ran in the opposite direction.

"No but you didn't see the way that big one was looking at us!" I explained through tears on the phone to my friend who was on the other side of the monkeys, just a few minutes walk down the road. "If you guys don't get past them you'll never see the panoramic view we've been looking for all morning," he explained. It was at this point that I couldn't help but laugh. I was lost in the mountains, in the heart of Morocco, with a pack of wild and vicious monkeys blocking my way to the view I had traveled five hours by train and grand-taxi to see. "What is my life?" I thought. After discussing it with my three friends who had come the same

direction as me, we decided we just did not have the courage to venture back down the monkeys' road. We took the road less traveled, without much hope we would find anything nearly as interesting as what we were sure our friends would find on the other side of the mountain. Angry and jealous of those five who were on their way to a comfortable picnic with a scenic view, we slowly trudged along the steep mountain road, unsure of what would lie ahead..."

We are eager to hear your reflections from your time in the Arab World. Not only are your experiences an adventure to read, but they also serve as an important resource for current and prospective students.

#### SCHOLARSHIP RESOURCES:

A <u>new section</u> on the AMIDEAST Alumni Association web page features information on continuing your education in the Middle East and North Africa. Below you can some great websites to search for jobs in all fields in the Middle East. For more suggestions visit our website.

- 1. <u>Reliefweb.com</u> Site dedicated to providing humanitarian information and analysis. Relief Web also lists internships, jobs, and volunteer opportunities from many international organizations and NGOs. Contains a very large number of opportunities around the globe.
- 2. <u>Carnegie Endowment for International Peace</u>-Regularly updated job postings for the Carnegie think tank in D.C. and abroad, including Beirut, Lebanon. There are limited internships and entry-level positions, so check frequently.
- 3. <u>NAFSA</u>-Job postings, fair amount of entry level positions, related to international education.

#### **TEACH ENGLISH WITH AMIDEAST:**

In our last issue, we highlighted <u>AMIDEAST's new Professional Certificate in English</u> <u>Language Teaching (PCELT)</u>. If you already have experience teaching English or just

#### **CURRENT INTERNSHIP OPPORTUNITIES:**

- 1. The National Council on U.S.-Arab Relations is currently accepting applications for summer internships. From May 28th August 3rd, the National Council offers undergraduate and graduate students a ten-week professional, academic, and career opportunity internship in the nation's capital. The program features a demanding mix of professional involvement, intellectual challenge, career exploration, and cultural encounters designed to provide interns with a rich and varied experience during their time in Washington. - 2. AMIDEAST Headquarters in Washington DC is accepting applications for Education Abroad Interns for both the summer and fall of 2012 terms. Education Abroad interns have important functions at HQ, assisting Education Abroad staff directly, coordinating online social networking outreach, and providing pre-departure support for incoming AMIDEAST students. Applications for the summer internships are due April 1, 2012, and fall internship applications are due July 15, 2012. - 3. The Middle East Institute is also accepting applications for summer 2012 interns. Internships at the Middle East Institute (MEI) are designed to provide undergraduates who have completed at least one year of school, recent graduates, and graduate students considering a career in a Middle East related field with hands-on experience in a Washington non-profit organization that focuses exclusively on the Middle East. Interns obtain guidance, experience, and exposure to the Washington policy and scholarly community while helping out with the everyday operations of the Middle East Institute. Positions are available on a full or part-time basis with a minimum of 20 hours a week. Although there is no financial compensation for interns, MEI does offer each intern one free language class, a one-year electronic subscription to The Middle East Journal, and reimbursement for local travel expenses. 

## What's New at AMIDEAST Education Abroad Programs

Along with our new summer 2012 programs mentioned in the previous issue, AMIDEAST is developing several new semester programs in Morocco and Egypt. Education Abroad will be launching the inaugural semester of the Regional Studies in French program in Rabat, Morocco this coming Fall. Regional Studies will feature many of the same excursions and program attributes as the Area and Arabic Language Studies in Rabat, however classes will be taught exclusively in French. Additionally, in Egypt AMIDEAST is partnering with Cairo University to offer students an opportunity to study Civil Engineering in one of the most dynamic areas of the world.
